 - Registration will remain open through the summer until August 6, 2019 (one week prior to classes beginning).
- **CLASSES:**
 - Held on TUESDAYS only at the First Baptist Church of Woodstock campus.
 - Listed alphabetically by SUBJECT: Art, Bible, Dance, Electives, English, Foreign Language, History, Lunch, Math, Music, Physical Education, Science.
 - All classes are one hour long (with 5 minutes to change classes) UNLESS otherwise noted.
 - For each FALL class, there is a SPRING equivalent. Parents will be given the option at the end of the fall session to continue in the class or drop the class for spring with no financial obligation (unless the class is a year-long class where tuition is fully invoiced in the fall). This guarantees students a spot in the class for the year and allows parents to plan a full year.
 - Spring material fees are an estimate and subject to change upon teacher's request or expenses.
 - LUNCH:
 - Students in grades K-5th MUST be registered to a Lunch Bunch class unless with an ADULT during lunch.
 - Students in grades 6th-12th must be registered to one of the following if staying on campus for lunch:
 - Lunch: Student with Parent
 - Lunch (in the B-Foyer or Fellowship Hall)
 - Lunch: HS Lunch (11:30-12:00)
 - GAPS: Students cannot be left unattended while on campus; therefore, if there are gaps in your student's schedule, please fill those in with one of the following: Study Hall, Student Assistant, Student with Parent, B-Foyer (high school students only).
 - CHRISTMAS BREAK ASSIGNMENTS: Academic classes will have two to three weeks' worth of work over the Christmas break.
 - "FLIPPED" Classroom: What is a "flipped" classroom? A flipped classroom blends learning at home and in the classroom. The subject content is presented on-line to the student throughout the week and the teacher leads the learning and discussion on the following Tuesday. This opportunity provides students a first exposure learning prior to coming to class on Tuesday. Class time can be spent on activities that will encourage students to process and apply the principals learned prior to class. The activities in class can range from mini-lectures in response to student questions, group discussions, and student presentations. Tuesday's, in-class time will provide an environment for deeper learning.
- **TUITION/COSTS:**
 - Tuition and material fees are listed on a per-class basis and cover the 14-week session UNLESS denoted as yearly costs.
 - Material fees are invoiced per session unless noted. The material fee covers supplies for each class unless otherwise noted with a PARENT TO PURCHASE.
 - Registration Fee: \$25 per student per session
 - Uniform shirt is required. Can purchase t-shirt at OPEN HOUSE and pre-order shirts to be shipped to you.
 - **Payment Plan** is available at no additional charge to accommodate your family budget. Our online registration system currently allows for six months of payments if registering in May, five in June, four in July, and so on.

• **REFUND POLICY:**

- Since our financial budget is based on enrollment, parents are expected to commit to the program upon registration (registration is defined as status on class is “Enrolled”) for the entire session (and year if an academic, year-long class is chosen). Refunds of tuition and material fees will not be given after you have enrolled in classes. Exceptions will be considered for families experiencing death or medical emergencies, loss of work, or job transfer out of the area; however, once the session begins, the consideration will include proration or no refund at all depending on the number of weeks your student attended classes. No exceptions will be made for enrolling students in any other educational program.
- We understand that classes close during registration, but please be mindful of this as you make your class selections at registration. Switching/withdrawing classes can jeopardize other classes and teacher’s jobs; therefore, parents will be responsible for the financials of the class **added and dropped** if you choose to switch or withdraw from classes after enrolling a student. If a class is dropped and that seat can be filled, a refund will be given; otherwise, you are responsible for payment of the class.

But the Israelites keep turning away from God, so he sends 12 judges, including Deborah and Samson, to point them back to the One who gave them the Promised Land, and learn all about the story of Ruth and Boaz. Next, relive the stories of Israel's kings-Saul, David and Solomon. David messes, but God makes him a big promise. David's son Solomon asks God for wisdom, but he doesn't always remember to put God first. Your kids will learn about pride, repentance and wisdom from Israel's three kings! We will finish the year following the nations of Israel and Judah as they go through 39 kings! This class will take students with little or no knowledge of ASL and Deaf Culture and provide them with the skills needed to communicate in the Deaf community in a way that is respectful and aware. This class will complete the student text *Signing Naturally Units 1-6* and will also work through ASL 1 online material from *LifePrint* by Bill Vicars. Other internet materials and videos will also be incorporated.

Class time will be both instructional and interactive. Much of the course will be completed through independent study of online material and practice material in the curriculum. Students will be required to have access to the internet, post videos of themselves (i.e. Dropbox, YouTube, Google Drive...) for testing evaluation, and interact with other students outside of class (library lab time or video chat – Facetime, Zoom, Skype, ...) The student workbook uses an accompanying DVD that provides the video prompts for the homework questions.

Tuition includes 1-hour class time, online instruction and assignments, plus labs at Woodstock Library on 7 Thursdays per semester.
